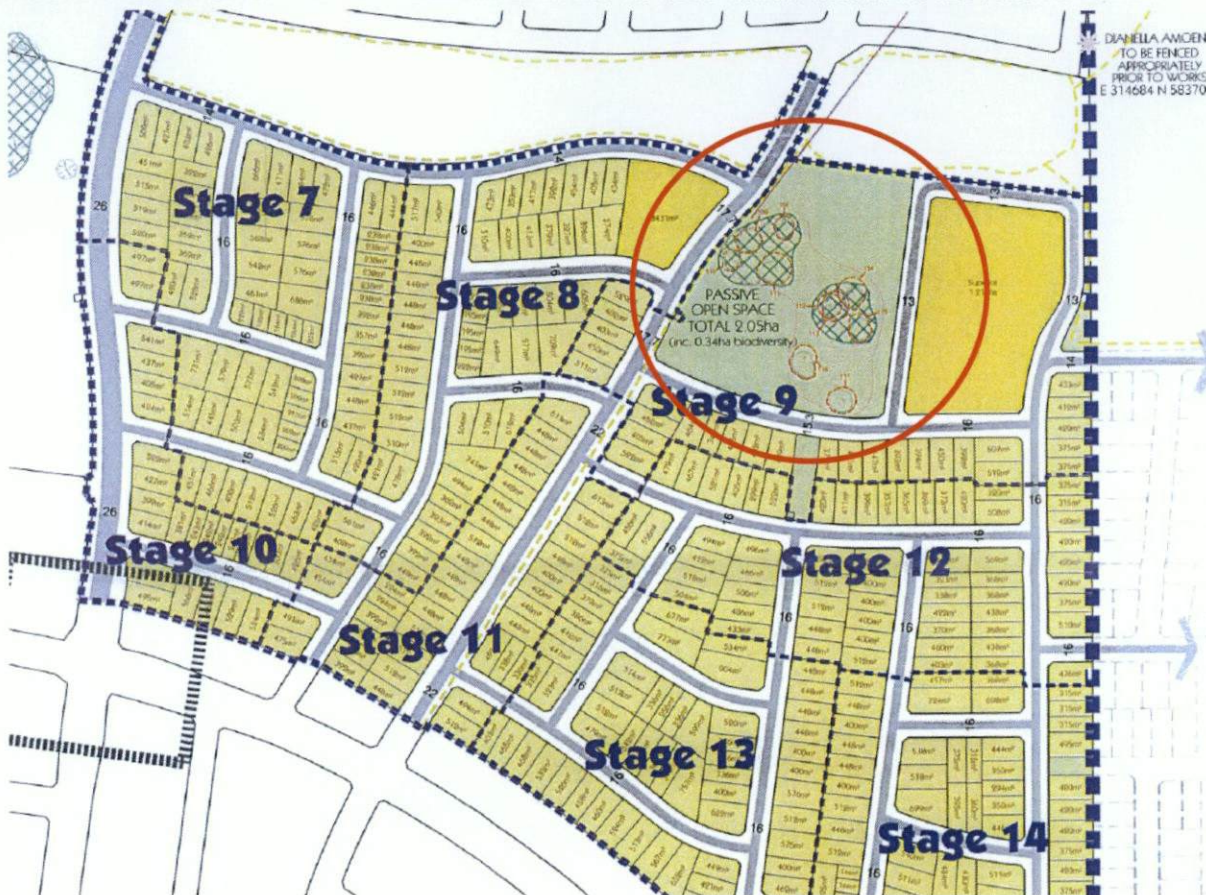

3 Assessment

In assessing the appropriateness of the proposed name, we have perused DEPI's *Guidelines for Geographic Names 2010*, Hume City Council's *Place Names Policy 2008* and the *Geographic Place Names Act 1998*. As the Hume City Council's *Place Names Policy 2008* has been prepared cognisant of DEPI's guidelines, it is in our view that the *Principles* contained within Section 1.8 of DEPI's *Guidelines for Geographic Names 2010*, will be the most applicable guideline for this assessment. Compliance of the proposed name against these *Principles* are addressed within the following sections.

3.1 PRINCIPLE 1(A) LANGUAGE

The proposed name is in a recognised format of an Australian Indigenous language local to the area, Woi wurrung. The *Principles* note that names in an Australian Indigenous language may appear complex at first but "will, over time become familiar and easy to use within the community."
