Getting ready for the Fire Danger Period

With summer here it is important to ensure your property is fire ready, especially if you live among grass and paddocks.

Prepare yourself and your property by:

- having a fire plan and kit ready
- maintaining and keeping grass and weeds at 10cm or less
- removing or pruning dead leaves and tree branches
- removing flammable materials such as old tyres and rubbish
- checking your insurance to ensure fences, outbuildings and their contents are covered
- getting to know your neighbours so you can assist or ask for assistance if need be.

Properties that present possible fire risks may be issued with a Fire Prevention Notice or infringement notice

Livestock theft in Hume

There have been a number of incidents of livestock theft in Hume City over the past year, including dorper sheep from northern Sunbury and Wildwood.

To help reduce the risk of theft on your property, there are some steps you can take:

- check stock numbers regularly
- keep receipts and records of any purchase as proof of ownership
- take photos and videos of your and any agisted livestock regularly to assist with identification
- lock and secure fencing, gates, loading ramps and stockyards, and where possible have them in view of your house
- tag livestock at an early age using National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) tags.

If you have experienced livestock theft, no matter how small, report all incidents to Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 or your local police station.

Agricultural management in the urban fringe

Insights from local farmer and agricultural consultant Charles Grech.

Managing agricultural properties and a contracting business within the urban fringe does not come without its unique challenges – with limited options for agricultural machinery support, noxious weeds limiting fodder conservation as well as restrictions or overlays that limit aerial spraying, property scope, and movement of oversized equipment between properties.

However, these challenges have also provided an opportunity for Dr Charles Grech of Oaklands Junction to develop a niche for his agricultural consultancy and contract services business.

By operating in this area, he has been able to educate and assist landholders – who may be new to land management and have limited experience – on how to best manage their properties or livestock systems.

Weed control is a key issue for most land managers in Hume and, despite having an agricultural science degree and a PhD in grazing management, Charles too was floored by the sheer stubbornness of Artichoke Thistle and the persistence required to manage it on his property.

However, his experience in grazing, farm management and his agricultural services business meant he recognised where property managers often failed. Most commonly, inappropriate grazing management allowing weeds to spread.

Within a few years of implementing a new system of rotational grazing, aerial and ground spraying, as well as fencing new paddocks and paddock resting, Artichoke Thistle has now almost been eradicated from the property, with a tall competitive pasture preventing most new weed germination.



Charles' key advice for landholders to maintain their property is to stop weeds entering their property and prevent overgrazing, with overgrazing being the biggest cause of weed issues he encounters. This also applies when entering agistment agreements; be sure you know the intended stocking rate and don't let leasees graze the property below ankle level. The cost of the weed control after overgrazing will outweigh any profit made from the grazing!

Rebates and grants to assist rural residents

Councils offers the Primary Producer Rate Rebate and Rural Land Management Grant to support local land managers.

- Rural Land Management Grant A grant of \$300 plus \$20 per hectare of property to assist with land management and revegetation. This grant is for properties 0.4 hectares or greater in the Green Wedge, Rural Living, and Farming zones with satisfactory land management.
- Primary Producer Rate Rebate
 A 30 per cent discount on the general rate for demonstrated agricultural businesses on properties over two hectares with satisfactory land management.

Late summer is rabbit control time

If you have rabbit problems on your property, late summer is the best time to control them as breeding slows and food supply reduces.

During this time Council will also be undertaking rabbit control on public reserves with a particular focus in the reserves north of Sunbury.
