1. ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF TRADITIONAL OWNERS

7. PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

PQ976 PUBLIC QUESTION – CHRIS O'NEIL

Over the past 10 years and including the 23/24 budget how many dollars have been spent upgrading or building new sports, aquatic, leisure centres, sporting grounds or similar. Please provide a break down per ward?

RESPONSE: CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

Over the past 10 years, the amount spent on upgrading or building new sports, aquatic, leisure centres, sporting grounds or similar is as follows:

- 1. Aitken Ward \$99.10m
- 2. Jacksons Creek Ward \$24.19m
- 3. Meadow Valley Ward \$59.14m

In addition, a further amount of \$13.34m was spent across the entire municipality including sports ground lighting, fencing and drainage upgrades, the replacement of gym equipment at the various leisure and aquatic centres and maintaining the various skate parks and BMX tracks for the general public to use for free under Council's Skate, Scooter and BMX Plan.

It is important to note that a significant proportion of the works relating to the Aitken and the Meadow Valley wards relate to projects that were mandated by the precinct structure plans or funded through other S173 agreements with developers.

PQ977 PUBLIC QUESTION – CHRIS O'NEIL

In the 23/24 draft budget what is the percentage breakdown per ward of rates incoming, please supply by ward only.

RESPONSE: CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

The percentage breakdown of rates per ward is as follows:

- 1. Aitken Ward 37%
- 2. Jacksons Creek Ward 25%
- 3. Meadow Valley Ward 38%

PQ978 PUBLIC QUESTION – MELINDA O'NEIL

In the 23/24 draft budget what is the percentage of total rates being spent in each ward, please list by ward?

RESPONSE: CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

The percentage of rates being spent in each ward on capital works in 2023/24 is as follows:

The projects under CITYWIDE are the amounts spent across the entire municipality and are not specific to any one ward including our local road resurfacing program, installing indented parking on narrow streets, replacing broken footpath bays, developing new walking and cycling tracks, upgrading our vast network of open space and playgrounds, the installation public toilets, fleet renewal program, IT annual program, FOGO bins rollout program and continually updating our library stock.

Please note that the Councils operating budget is not allocated per ward and this split is not available.

PQ979 PUBLIC QUESTION – MELINDA O'NEIL

In the 23/24 draft budget what efficiency can rate payers be delivered from the computer system upgrade, I.e. How many staff will be cut by its implementation?

RESPONSE: CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

The proposed computer system upgrade will take approximately 3 years to fully implement. Following implementation Council is expected to realise efficiency benefits in that it will be able to better absorb and manage growth, provide better customer service and better maintain its asset base across the municipality without the need to continually add staff at the same rate. In 2023/24 no staff will be cut as a result of its implementation.

PQ980 PUBLIC QUESTION – DAVID NEWTON

Can council provide an overview of the current issues at the SALC including the fault, time for repair, time pool will remain closed, total cost to ratepayers for the repairs including the cost of refunding memberships for the period of time?

RESPONSE: ACTING DIRECTOR CITY SERVICES AND LIVING

The indoor 25m pool at the Sunbury Aquatic and Leisure Centre has experienced a leak in an underground pipe that runs alongside the pool shell. The leak has been isolated, and repairs commenced today. We expect the pool to be closed for 2 weeks from today.

Estimates indicate a total cost of \$45,000. The repairs cost approximately \$30,000, and the cost of refunding memberships is approximately \$15,000.

PQ981 PUBLIC QUESTION – DAVID NEWTON

Can council please provide a list of all expenditure on aquatic centres council wide over the past 10 years, including upgrades and construction of new facilities, please provide a breakdown per ward.?

RESPONSE: ACTING DIRECTOR CITY SERVICES AND LIVING

Over the past 10 years Council has spent \$70.7m on aquatic facilities across Hume.

PQ982 PUBLIC QUESTION – SHERINE KODSI

We note that Port Patrick Court has been identified as a 'narrow street' and is eligible for council-funded parking indents for over 5 years. Where is Port Patrick Court's position on this waitlist?

RESPONSE: DIRECTOR INFRASTRUCTURE AND ASSETS

Parking surveys were conducted on Port Patrick Court in 2018 and 2021, both surveys identified that Port Patrick Court met warrants for street length indented parking bays in line with the 'Hume City Parking on Narrow Streets Policy'. Based on its priority the street may be listed for funding consideration as early as 2025/26. Please note that this timing is subject to change based on the results of other surveys and the priority of competing projects.

PQ983 PUBLIC QUESTION – SHERINE KODSI

We note that 'Port Patrick Court is on the list of streets for construction of indented parking but this is subject to funding and ranking based on demand for other streets', what constitutes a high priority scenario? What is the criteria?

RESPONSE: DIRECTOR INFRASTRUCTURE AND ASSETS

In line with the Policy, the priority ranking for street length indented parking bays is based on the ratio of on-street parking demand and on-street parking capacity.

PQ984 PUBLIC QUESTION – LOCHIE

This question relates to the Annandale Road improvements.

For quite some time now, Annandale Road has been suffering from various issues that have significantly impacted its safety, cleanliness, and overall amenity. I kindly request that the Town Meeting acknowledges the urgency of this matter and my question to council is what are the immediate steps council will take to address the concerns raised?"

RESPONSE: DIRECTOR INFRASTRUCTURE AND ASSETS

9.1 NOM23/015 - Cr Joseph Haweil

That Council:

- 1.1 Writes to the Victorian Minister for Casino, Gaming and Liquor Regulation to:
 - Express its significant concern that the Victorian Community Benefits Scheme providing a tax break to Club-based poker machine operators of 8.33% is being widely abused by poker machine operators in Hume City and around Victoria to legally minimise tax liabilities under the pretext of philanthropic, charitable or benevolent causes.
 - Advise that Hume City Council analysis of Community Benefits Statements (CBS) over the last 5 financial years confirms that the overwhelming majority of claimed "community benefits" have been for operating costs (primarily wages and salaries) and that no Clubs claimed under the Class C (a) category for "the provision of responsible gambling measures and activities but excluding those required by law" in the 2021/22 financial year.
 - Advocate Council's concerns around the distribution of community benefits and the need for real direct benefits back into communities where losses are incurred.
 d. Call on the State Government to evaluate the redistribution provisions that currently apply to the community benefits program, particularly in light of the challenging fiscal environment and the ongoing misuse of the Scheme's intended outcomes by operators.
- 1.2 Officers provide a breakdown summary of the community benefits statements that have been submitted by Hume City sporting clubs over the last five years to inform Council on what/how "community benefits" have been directed back into the community and advocate for greater direct benefits into communities.

 - a) Route coverage
 - b) Service frequency

 - e) Options to extend services beyond the current service end time, including consideration of the introduction of a limited on-demand style service.
